#### Questions for Interviews

##### ➤ Education

1. What are your thoughts on introducing European studies to your education? Why?
2. What do you think/how do you feel about your educational system? Are there any changes needed? What changes would you make?
3. Do you think further education is accessible to you? Why?
4. Do you think learning languages is important? When should you start learning a second language?
5. Do you think school should be compulsory? How many years the school should be compulsory?

##### ➤ Employment

6. How did you find your 1<sup>st</sup> job? (student job or real work)
7. What would be your dream job?
8. Are there any possibilities for job seekers at your university?

##### ➤ Health

9. How much does a good health cost? Can you explain?
10. What could/should be done to prevent youngsters from getting anorexia?
11. What do you do to keep yourself healthy? What should you do to keep yourself healthy?
12. What is more important: moral principles or rational decisions? How can you balance these two?
13. Do you think soft drugs should be legal/illegal? Why?

#### Questions for Interviews

##### ➤ Local Institutions

14. If your local institution could identify an unused space, how could you put it to the best use for young people?
15. Are you aware of the youth facilities which exist in your area? What do you think local authorities should offer to young people?
16. If we won the lotto, what design/creation should be done in your area, more specifically for youngsters?
17. Do you think your local authority can do something for youngsters in your area now? Could we, ERYICA/Meet the Street Project representatives, seek European Funding for any of these ideas?
18. Where do you feel safe/comfortable? Why do you feel safe there? How do you think it is possible to create this safe feeling again?

##### ➤ Sports

19. Do you think sport is accessible in your area? Do you have to travel, is this inconvenient?
20. Do you think there is support for parents who don't have money for their children to play sport? What kind of support?

#### Meet the Street

**Meet the Street** is a project in which young “journalists” ask the opinion of their peers on subjects of importance for them. These interviews are recorded with mobile phones, then edited and uploaded on line. The project seeks to attain the following objectives:

- To foster non organised youngsters’ participation and initiative by giving them the opportunity to express their views by peer to peer interviews;
- To reach a large variety of young, less easily reachable Europeans, with different backgrounds;
- To meet policy makers in order to debate and address some of the issues European youngsters are interested in.
